### Principal's Message

#### **Bus Absence Protocol and Behaviour Reminders**

This is just a reminder about a few important procedures that parents must follow if your child rides a bus. **Bus Protocol for Absent Riders**: If your child is going to be absent from riding for a day, a morning or afternoon or for longer, please ensure that you:

- 1. Contact your bus driver ASAP so that they know and can adjust their route accordingly.
- 2. Write a note in your child's agenda so that the teacher knows.
- 3. Call Ms. Salomons so that she can let bus supervisors know.
- 4. If your child is able to walk home from school and also rides the bus, you still must follow the above protocols. Students should not be making last minute decisions about walking home without the bus driver and school knowing via parent communication in advance.

**Bus Behaviour:** Being a bus driver is like driving a classroom on wheels— it is a hard job! They have a huge responsibility to keep your child safe by being able to focus on the road all while managing student behavior occurring behind them. When their attention is distracted by inappropriate behaviour - yelling, talking loudly, moving around while the bus is in transit, throwing things, bothering other riders - their ability to focus on the road is compromised thus compromising the safety of all.

## The rules for riding the bus are very simple:

- Wear your mask (grade 4-6)
- Sit in your assigned seat
- Stay seated facing forward, talk quietly and leave other students alone.
- Follow the bus driver's instructions/directions

If your child breaks the rules on the bus, the driver will give them a warning. The second warning will come with a call home, notifying the school administration and perhaps a seat change. The third warning will result in a written Conduct Report to parents, the school administration and the transportation department. This will result in a meeting with the principal/vice principal, the parents, the student and driver. The child may be suspended from riding the bus for a period of time, be given a permanent seat change or both.

Thank you for going over these rules and expectations with your child and for attending to the absent rider protocol and supporting our amazing bus drivers.

#### Masks, Sanitizer and Physical Distancing Reminders

We have been in school for about eight weeks now, which has given us (students and staff) plenty of time to get used to all of our new routines, guidelines and expectations. The guidelines are very clear for us to follow in regard to mask wearing (gr. 4-6), sanitizing and physical distancing. For the most part, the majority of our students willingly follow these protocols, whether or not they agree with them. However, there are times when a few students still struggle. Please note that it is mandatory for grade 4– 6 students to wear masks; this is not negotiable without a medical note. As a reminder, our <u>Division's Re-Entry Plan</u> states that students in grades 4-6 refusing to wear a mask will be sent home for the day.



We appreciate your support in taking the time to reinforce the importance of following AHS guidelines for school and the bus to keep everyone safe and healthy. These include:

- Wearing a mask in all common areas for grade 4–6 students, including on the bus, to and from bus to school, in the bathrooms, hallways, classrooms, gym and library (unless given permission from the teacher to remove them). Teachers provide mask breaks throughout the day for students.
- HAND SANITIZER
- Wearing masks in kindergarten to grade 3 is recommended but not mandatory. Our bus drivers have asked K- 3 students to wear masks on the bus as well if they have them
- Sanitizing hands when getting on the school bus, into the school, entering and leaving each classrooms, the gym or library
- Maintaining a distance of 2 meters where ever possible inside and on the playground

Again, thank you for going over the importance of following these guidelines with your child. We are in this together!


